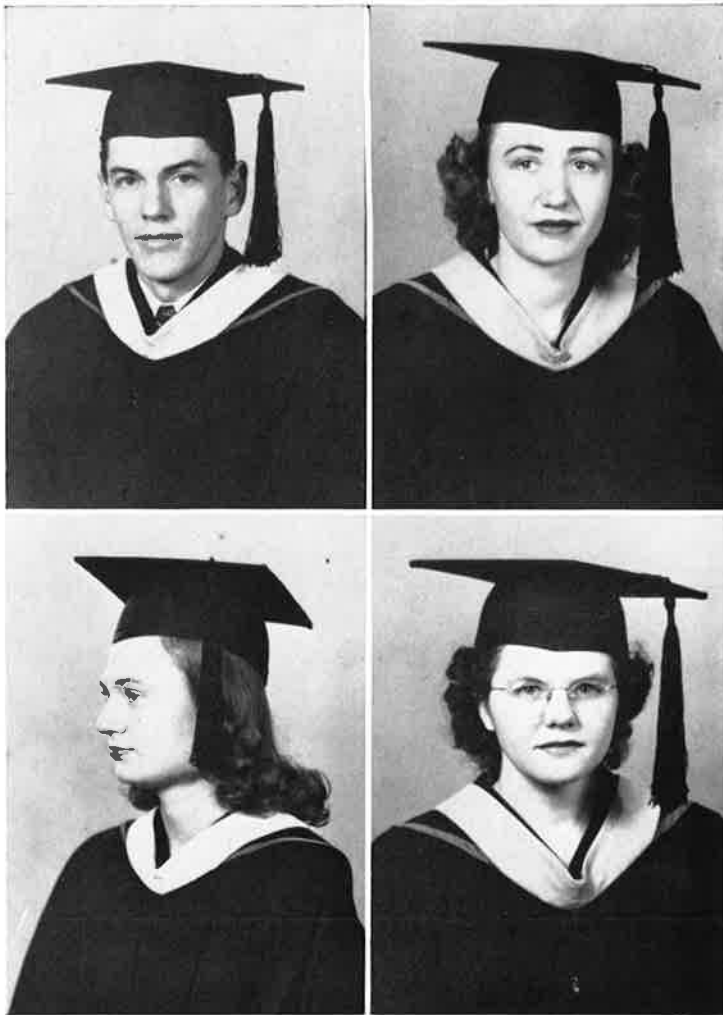

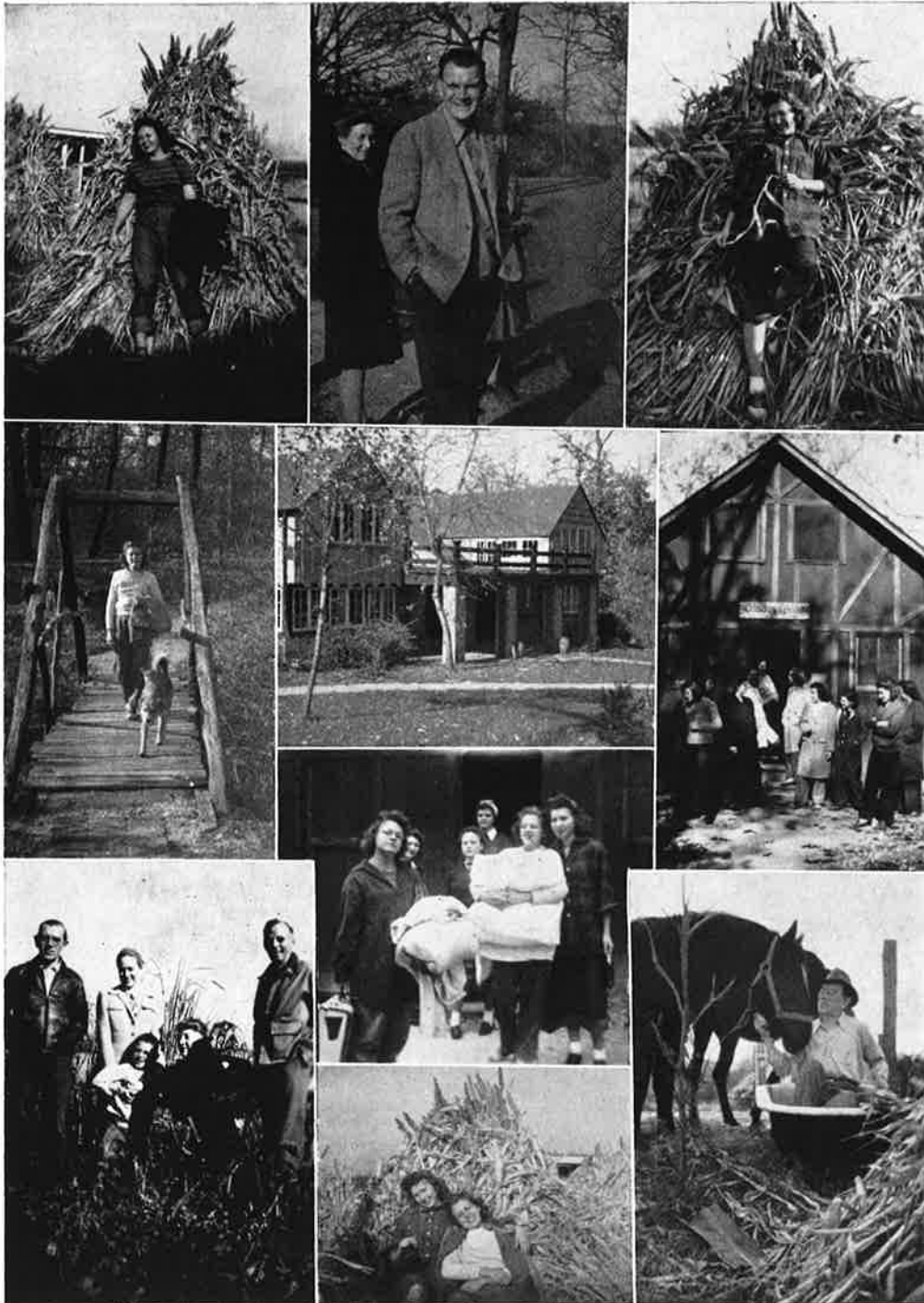

THE SENATE

This group consists of seven officers elected by the students each year, and officers from each of the clubs on campus. Meetings are held twice each month and the present adviser to the group is Clyde E. Hewitt. Among the responsibilities delegated to the Senate are approval of the organization of other clubs, apportionment of money for the clubs' budgets, and in general, direction of student activities which are not classified under the immediate supervision of any subsidiary organization.

MEMORIAL HALL FUND CAMPAIGN

The Five-Year Development Program of Aurora College began in 1945, and a significant feature of that Program which is the erection of a Memorial Hall of Physical Education was undertaken in 1946 by the alumni. The Senate presented the project of raising a portion of the proposed amount to the Students' Association, and it was agreed that each individual student "give or get" \$100 in order to raise this sum. Thus far, the returns from all the classes has been gratifying and the alumni, the administration and the student body look forward to a greater Aurora with the assistance of the many friends of the college.

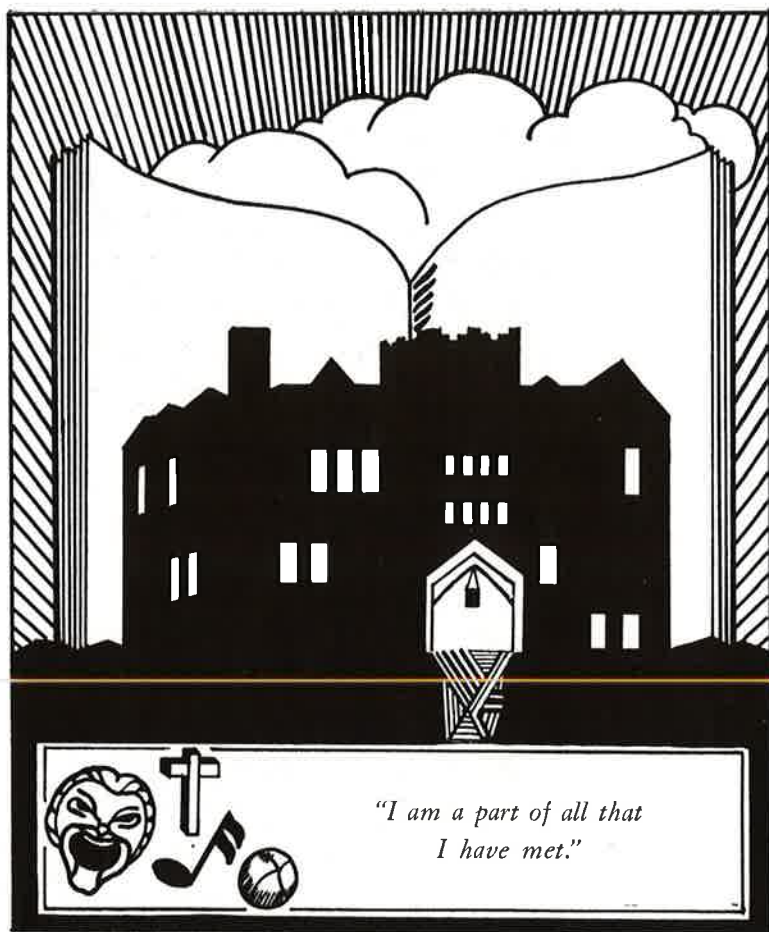
AURORA'S PROGRESS IN EDUCATIONAL RESEARCH

This year Aurora College has participated in a cooperative study of the North Central Association to seek ways in which member institutions could increase the value of their service to their students. A college representative spent a month in the summer of 1945 in a conference workshop at the University of Chicago in developing Aurora's part in the program. It appeared that Aurora's special opportunity for service to the study and to Aurora students lay in developing ways of giving more extensive and positive help to the individual student in realizing his highest possibilities in all areas, but especially in the fields of personality, character and professional development.

In the fall of 1945 a faculty committee (S. H. Perry, C. R. Singleterry, Grace M. Council, Ethel Tapper, chairman) began study of the problem. The first project was the development of an all-staff counseling program in which emphasis was placed upon individual and helpful friendship between staff members and students. Dr. George E. Hill, Director of Personnel Services at Macalester College representing the North Central Association, spent two days in March on the Aurora campus. In several meetings with the faculty and in a general assembly address, he brought help and constructive suggestions for the strengthening and extension of this program of friendly counseling.

As the year progressed, other phases of campus life were considered for their bearing on the development of personality. During the spring quarter, members of the college community, both staff and students, considered how student part-time employment might contribute most effectively to personality growth.

Because it is representative of Aurora's ideals and because the results of the investigation may be of service to other colleges as well as to Aurora, the research study will be continued another year. Attention will be directed to the perfecting of counseling techniques to strengthen the project already under way. The study of employment will be carried forward. Extra-curricular activities, dormitory life, and teacher-student relationships in the classroom will be studied for their contributions to the development of personality and character. It is hoped that the total study will grow more and more into a joint project in which students and staff may work out together the methods for making the years at Aurora the most significant in Aurora students' lives.



This is the way in which the faculty and students at Aurora College work and play, capturing together a part of the distinctive spirit which permeates the life on its campus. The men and women here at Aurora feel that participation in activities beyond the "line of duty" yields magnificent returns both in a social and spiritual sense. Personal development in leadership, poise and self-reliance may be counted among the benefits of serving with others as a committee, playing on the soft-ball team or acting as host to a new student. The integration of personality which comes as a result of having taken these places of personal responsibility brings us to a point which makes us more receptive to understanding and Truth.

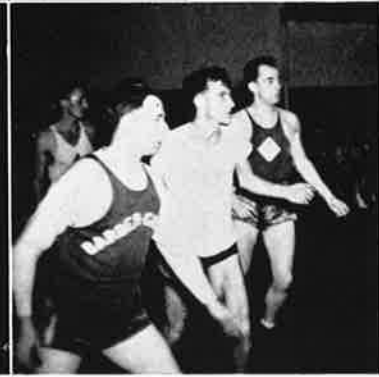


THE AURORA BOREALIS
