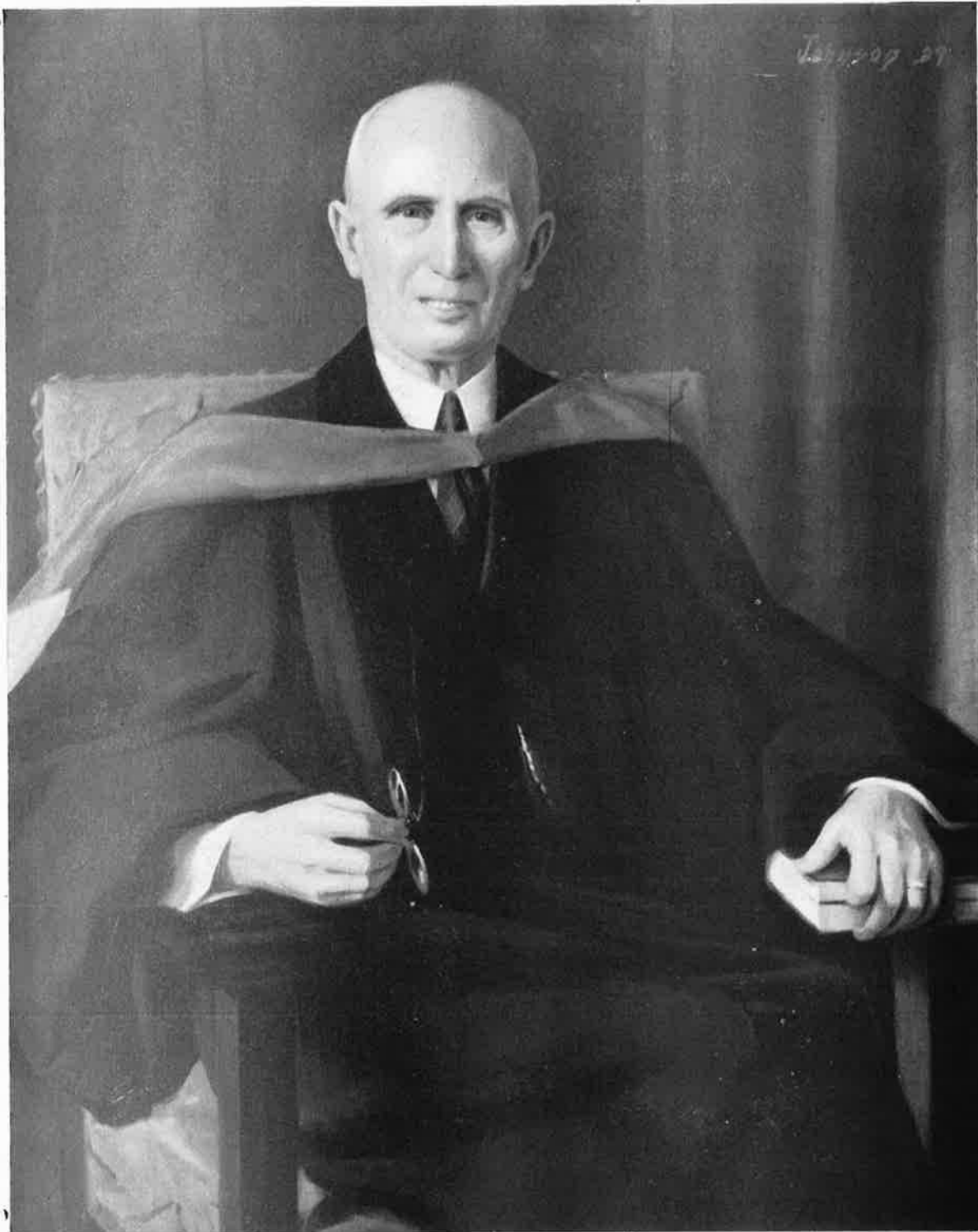

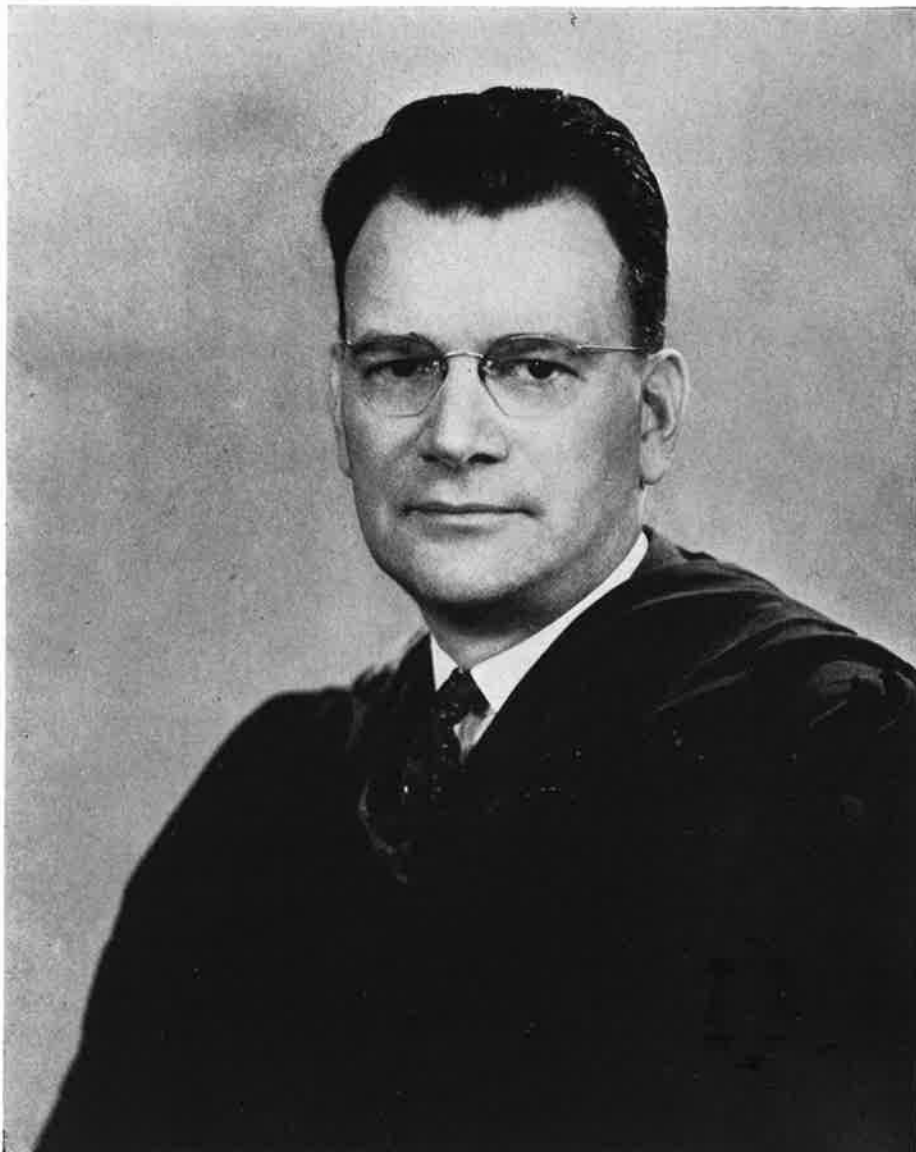




President Emeritus Orrin R. Jenks

The Spartan Award . . .

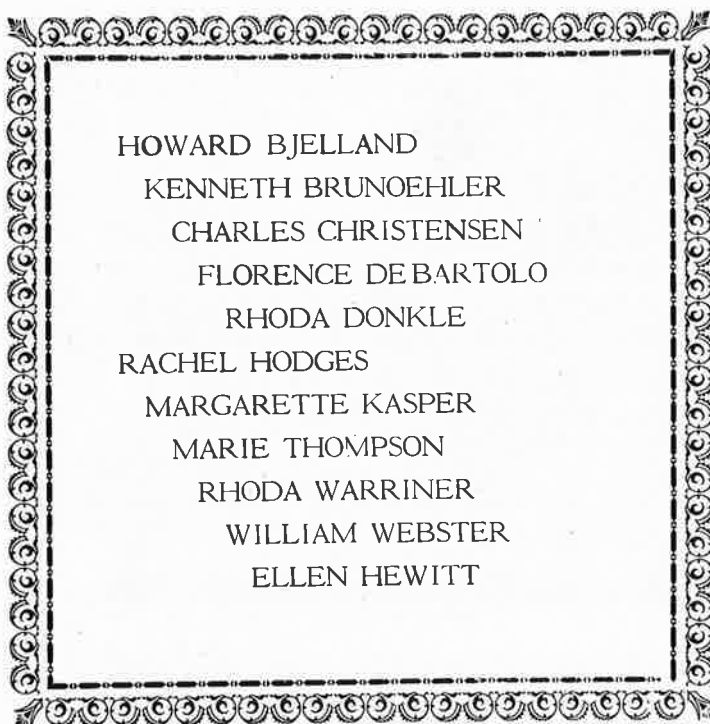


CHARLES NEIL CHRISTENSEN

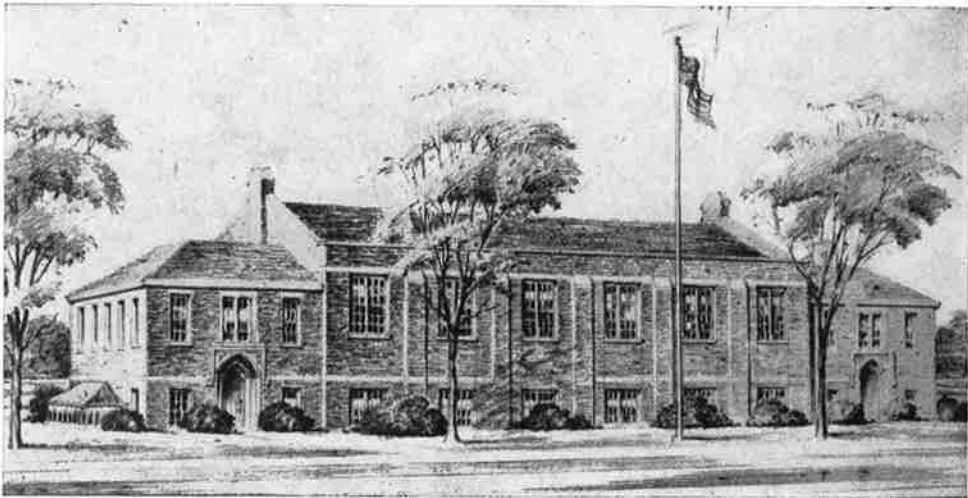

The Memorial Hall of Physical Education

The architect's drawing which appears above represents the present stage of our dreams for Memorial Hall. The inflation of building costs makes it impracticable to consider its construction at the present time. Therefore, a temporary gymnasium has been erected of much lighter construction and without many of the features to be included in the permanent building. Alumni gifts have not been used in the erection of this building.

The Memorial Hall Fund is growing steadily as some alumni pay their pledges and as others make their initial gifts. The building will cost not less than \$200,000. It will demand the best efforts of alumni, students and friends of Aurora College to secure this sum so as to be ready to build when general conditions are more favorable.

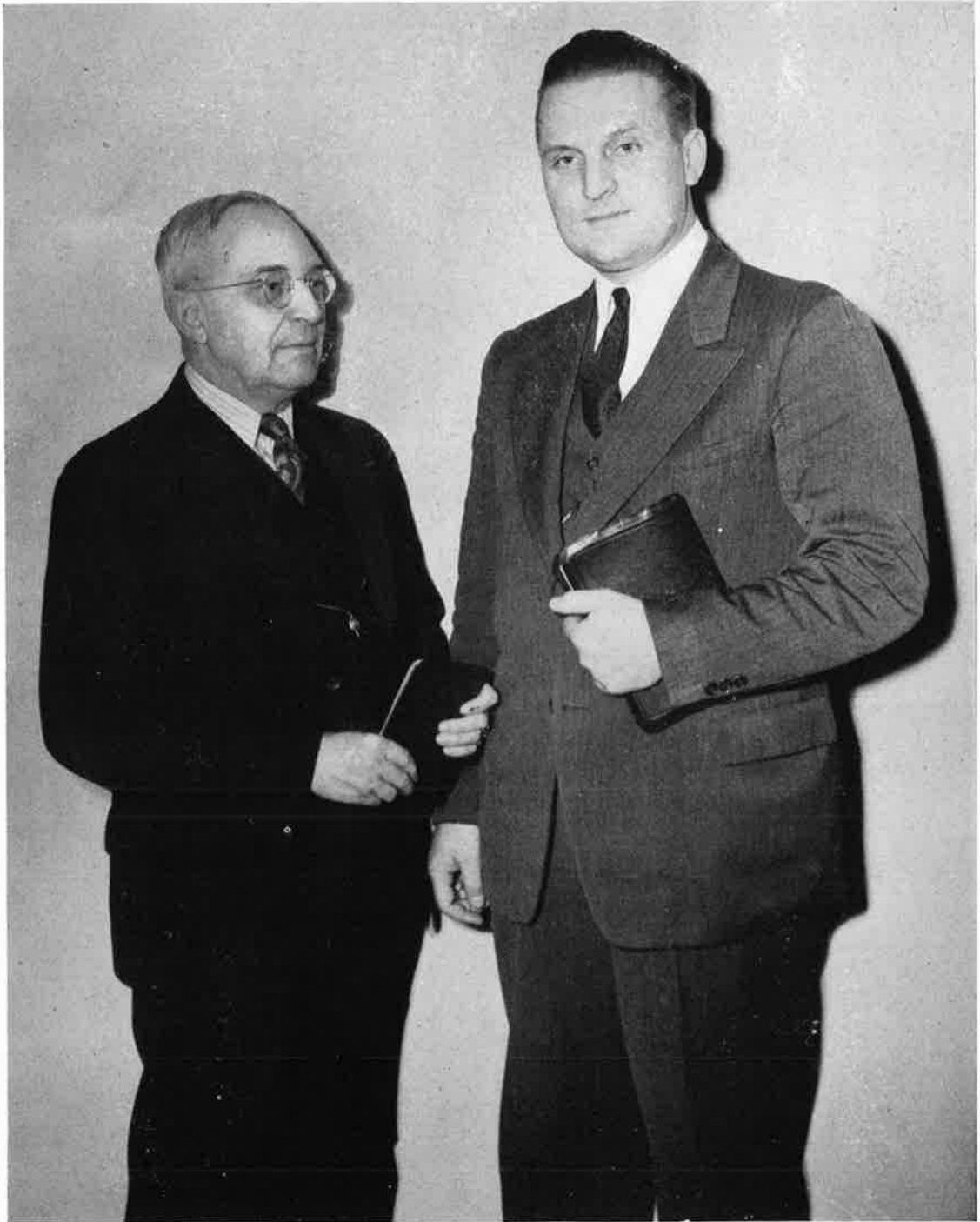

The Aurora College Chorus, under the direction of Miss Maude Bouslough, had many opportunities during the year to prove their versatility and singing ability. Concerts were given at the Aurora Elks Club, the Hinsdale Episcopal Church, and the College Church. The choir also assisted at one of the Religious Emphasis Week services, the Parent's Night program, Homecoming, and the spring Talent Show.

The high spot of the year for most of them was the eight-day midwestern choir trip taken between the spring and summer quarters. There were twenty-eight who made the trip in a super Trailways Bus with reclining seats, air conditioning, etc. They left Aurora Sunday morning at 8 a.m., singing their first concert at 11 a.m. in the Magnolia, Wisconsin, Church. After a huge feed by the women of the church, the choir continued on to Watertown, Wisconsin, where they sang an evening concert. Bright and early the next morning the group was on its way to LaValle, Wisconsin, where its second evening concert was sung. Tuesday afternoon found them beside beautiful Lake Chetek where, after an afternoon dip in the lake, they sang to an enthusiastic congregation in the Advent Christian Church there. Minneapolis, Minnesota, was the next stop. It was early enough so that those who wanted to had the opportunity of seeing the downtown and surrounding lake residential districts of that beauti-

ful city. The next lap of the trip was the longest—420 miles. An early departure, combined with skillful driving and a good tail wind, put the singers into Villisca, Iowa, in plenty of time for a delicious chicken dinner before concert time. As far as hospitality is concerned, future choirs on tour will do well to remember Villisca. From here the group journeyed to M. Ayr, Iowa, where the congregation literally waded through mud to hear them sing. Long distance calling, several changes in plans, and a good piece of luck, combined in getting the bus across the swollen and raging Mississippi River to the choir's next concert at Auburn, Illinois. The trip officially ended with a last concert at Mendota, Illinois, Sunday evening, June 22.

The trip wasn't all driving and singing, however. Between LaValle and Chetek, Wisconsin, is one of nature's phenomenons called The Dells. The choir had the opportunity of touring and inspecting this wonderland by boat, and later on had the thrills of climbing around a similar paradise at St. Croix Falls, Minnesota. Lake Chetek afforded the opportunity of a swim, but cold water kept all but the hardiest on shore. The cities of Minneapolis and Springfield, Ill., provided the sights and thrill of a big city. All this, combined with wonderful hospitality, delicious dinners, glorious fellowship, and inspiring concerts, proved to be a trip the choir members will not soon forget.

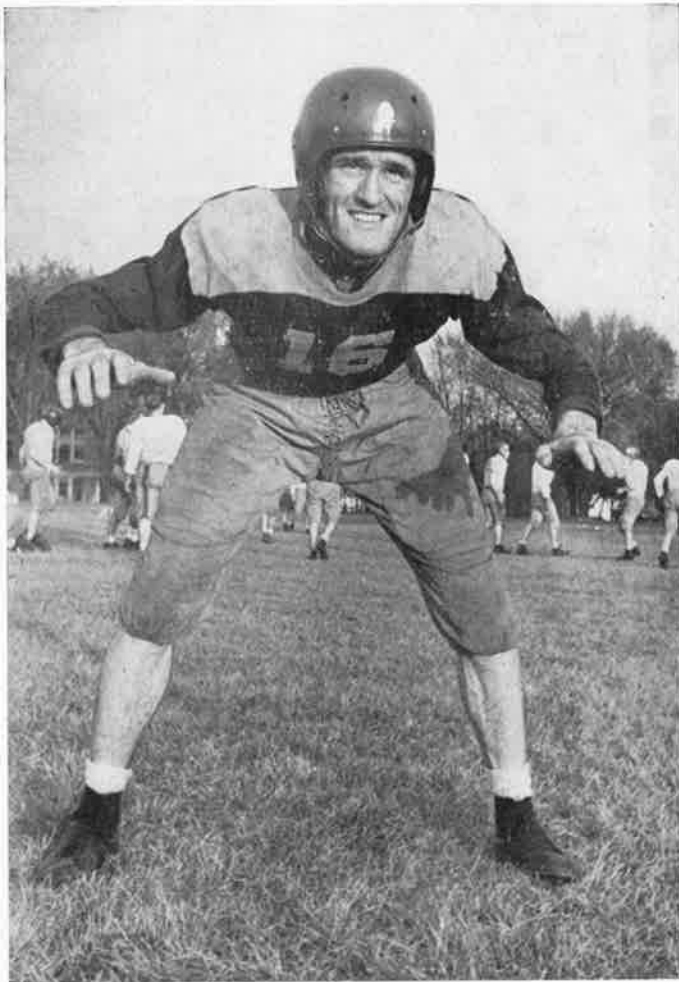

Aurora - 20 Northwestern - 12

The Spartans, receiving the opening kick-off, drove sixty-eight yards to a touchdown; Mitchler scored on a quarterback sneak from the one-yard line. Gilbert missed the kick for point.

Aurora, recovering a Northwestern fumble a few minutes later, ran the ball from the midfield strip to score in thirteen plays. Gilbert scored on a short pass from Terebessy. Gilbert kicked the extra point.

Late in the second quarter, Northwestern penetrated deep into Aurora territory on a fifty-yard pass, complete to the Aurora 7 yard line. A five-yard penalty pushed Northwestern back to the 12 from where they were unable to score before time ran out.

Aurora kicked off to open the second half, and received their own kick on the Northwestern 40. The Spartans drove to the Northwestern 3. Terebessy played over guard to score. Gilbert kicked the point.

Northwestern scored late in the third period when Ziesemer recovered a blocked punt in the Aurora end zone for a touchdown. Kick for point was wide.

The final score of the game came when Hackbarth interrupted an Aurora pass at midfield and raced over the Aurora goal line. Kick for point was again wide.

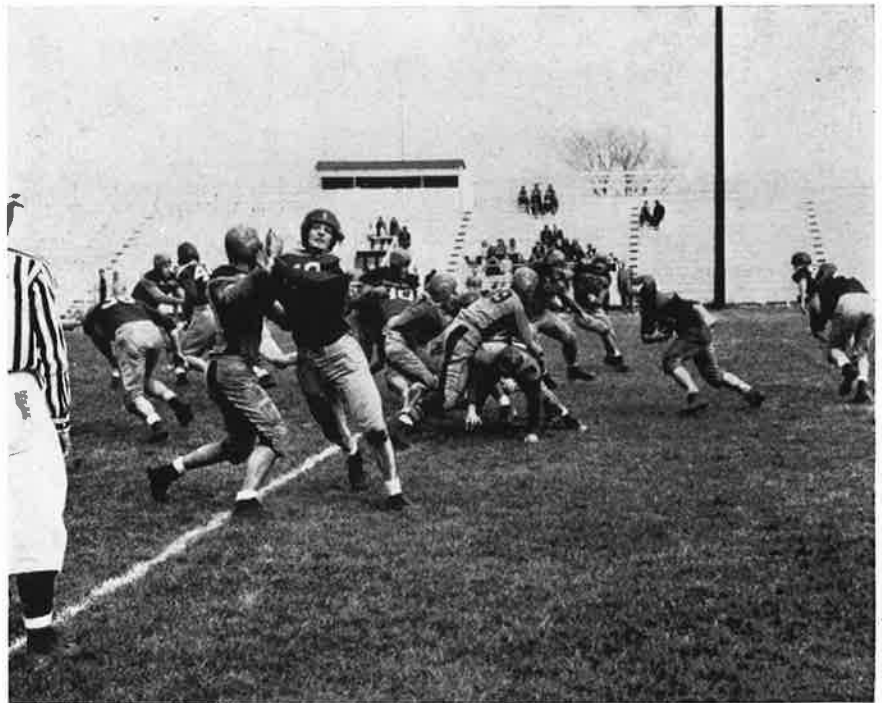
Although Aurora college ran rings around Concordia college, but got only a 6 to 6 tie, they three times had scoring opportunities after marking up their only touchdown in the first five minutes of the game.

Gilbert intercepted a Concordia pass on the Aurora 10 yard line and returned it to his own 45. Next the former Marmion star whipped through to the Concordia 18 from where Dave Svec went over for the score, but the point try was missed.

The host club knotted the count in the second period after Aurora had been penalized to their own four yard stripe following a punt that went out of bounds on their own 22. Roman Valleskey, left halfback, shot around right end for the score but his try for the extra point also was stopped.

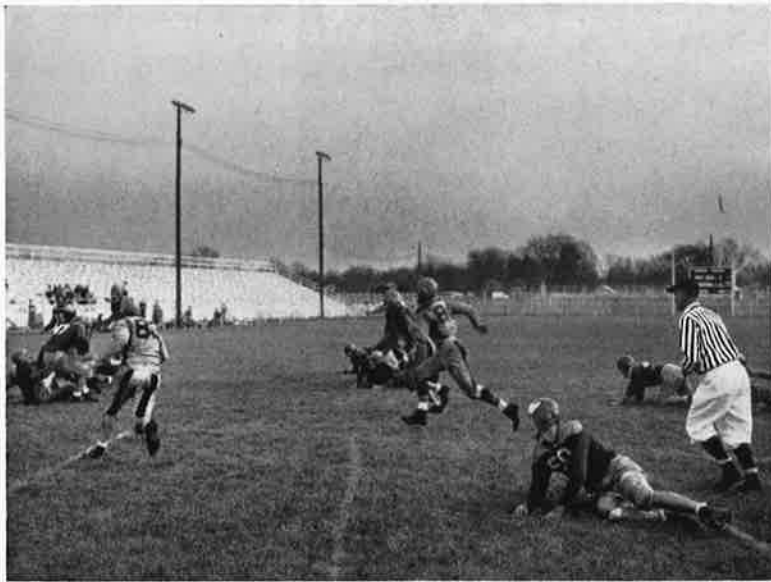
The visitors marked up nine first downs, gained 212 yards from scrimmage, 12 by passing and 49 on pass interceptions while Concordia got five first downs, gained 84 yards from rushing and 90 by passing. Aurora was penalized 85 yards while the host club lost but 25 for miscues.

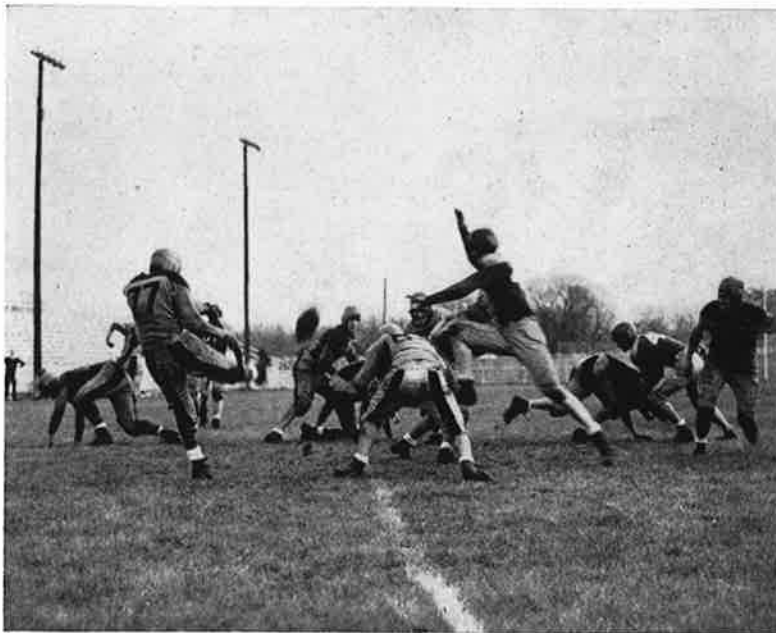

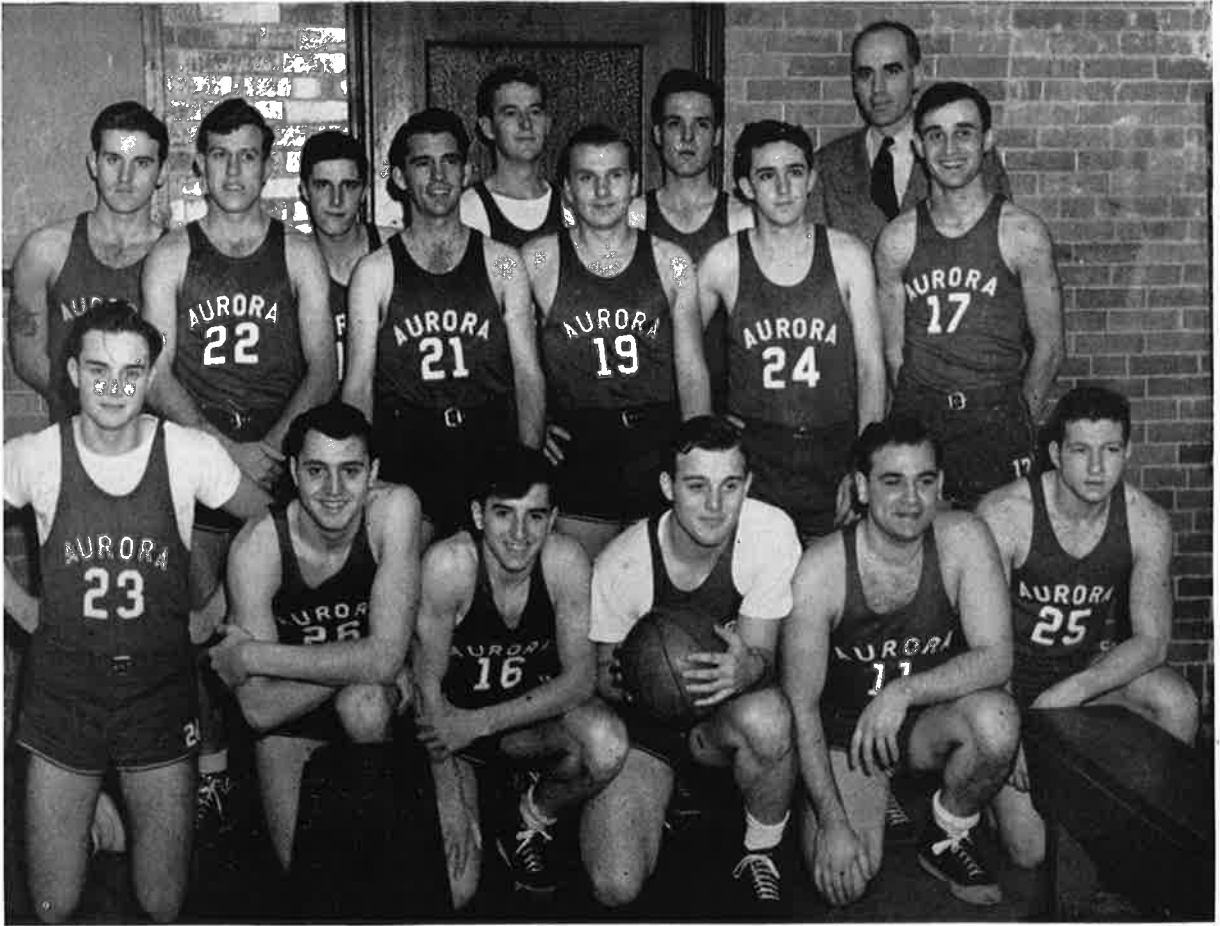

Basketball . . .

Review of 46-47 Cage Season

Playing before a near capacity house, the Aurora College Spartans opened the 1946-1947 basketball season at West High gym against Elmhurst College. Elmhurst stopped the last minute thrust of the Spartans and came out on the long end of a 58 to 50 score.

Staving off a last minute rally that saw Concordia pull up within one point of a tie ball game, the Aurora College Spartans garnered their first victory in two starts downing Concordia College 49 to 48 at the West High gymnasium.

Aurora College, on its trek downstate during the weekend of December seventh and eighth, broke even in two cage engagements. The Spartans lost the first tilt to Shurtleff 52-51 and swamped McKendrie College by the count of 71-45.

The winning streak of the Aurora College Spartans was extended to three games as the Blue and White gained two decisions as the home team topped North Park College 61-41 and took the strong Oak Park "Y" into camp by the count of 63 to 50.

The Aurora Spartans notched their fifth win of the season when they out-lasting the Chicago Teacher's College Quintet 52-50. The game was highlighted by the fact that 34 personals were called against the Spartans.

The Spartans sought in vain their fifth consecutive win at the expense of Concordia. However, the Blue and White just couldn't get moving and wound up on the short end of a 58-48 count.

A Homecoming crowd, that was the greatest yet recorded this season, saw the Blue and White of Aurora College score a 70-58 victory over Percy Snell's Quincy five. It was sweet revenge for Coach Vern Gilkey since Snell's footballers defeated the Spartan gridgers when these two coaches matched wits last November.

Aurora College was defeated by a fast-moving Chicago Teacher's five. The Spartans were forced to play without the services of Otto Terebessy and Pete Benson, who were on the sick list, and without Tubby Mahoney. The loss of these three men contributed largely to the shoddy display of the Spartans.

Coach Vern Gilkey's cagers returned to their home floor in an effort to avenge a 61-60 loss to Mission House Saturday evening, but again Mission edged out a 42-40 verdict on West High court.

The Blue and White from A. C. took a 52-48 licking from North Park College. The Spartans trailed at one stage, 41-20 and then they made their

bid. The game was not as even as the score indicated, the Spartans playing very shoddy basketball. The former hamburger line started the Spartan rally and the regulars kept it moving.

The Aurora College Spartans snapped a five game losing streak at the expense of a fast Elmhurst College five. When the final whistle blew the Spartans had a 49-46 upset win tucked under their belts.

A fast five from Shurtleff defeated the Aurora Spartans, behind an overpowering attack. The Blue and White's revamped squad failed to cope with the blistering pace set by the downstate boys and they were forced to retire from the floor on the short end of a 66-48 count. It was the second meeting of the two teams this season, and the Shurtleff cagers captured both games.

The Blue and White from Aurora college took a double defeat on one of their road trips. Quincy topped the Spartans, 59-37 and Eureka opened the victory door, 59-50.

The Spartan's home finale turned into the largest scoring brigade of the season. From the tip-off 'till the final gun, both quintets were playing fire-wagon brand of ball and hitting a torrid percent of their shots from all angles on the court. The Spartan followers were given their biggest thrills of the year while watching their team connect for 37 buckets and Northwestern 39.

It was a nip and tuck affair all the way to the last 10-minute period when Northwestern's far superior height and ability at the charity toss circle spelled the difference. Final: 90-80.

Aurora traveled to Watertown, Wisconsin for a return engagement and in quest of a victory after dropping the scoring brigade at the armory, but ten points again was the margin of victory for Northwestern, 59-49.

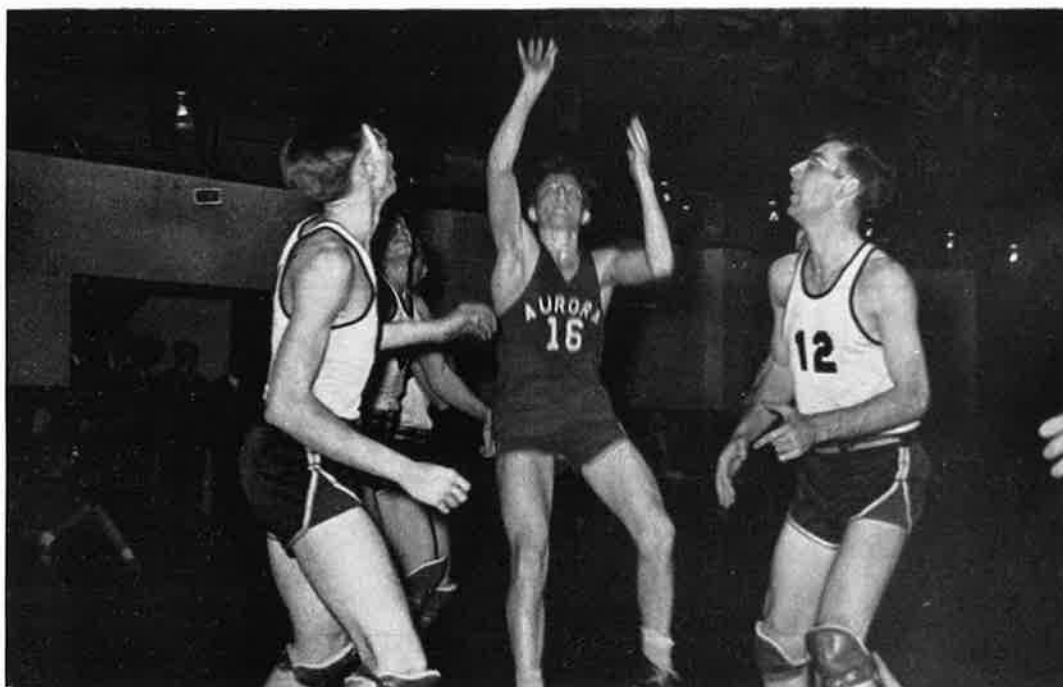
The Aurora Spartans gained their eighth victory of the season by romping over George Williams College 62-51. The Southsiders had a previous season record of ten wins against two losses, but their accumulation of wins failed to impress the Aurora Five to the extent of allowing them to gain their eleventh win.

In a wild harum-scarum game that bristled with action from start to finish, the Oak Park "Y" edged out a 63-62 verdict in the last two seconds of play. The Spartans were winning with twenty seconds remaining, 62-59, when Oak Park sunk a free-throw to go ahead and win a thrilling final game from the Spartans.

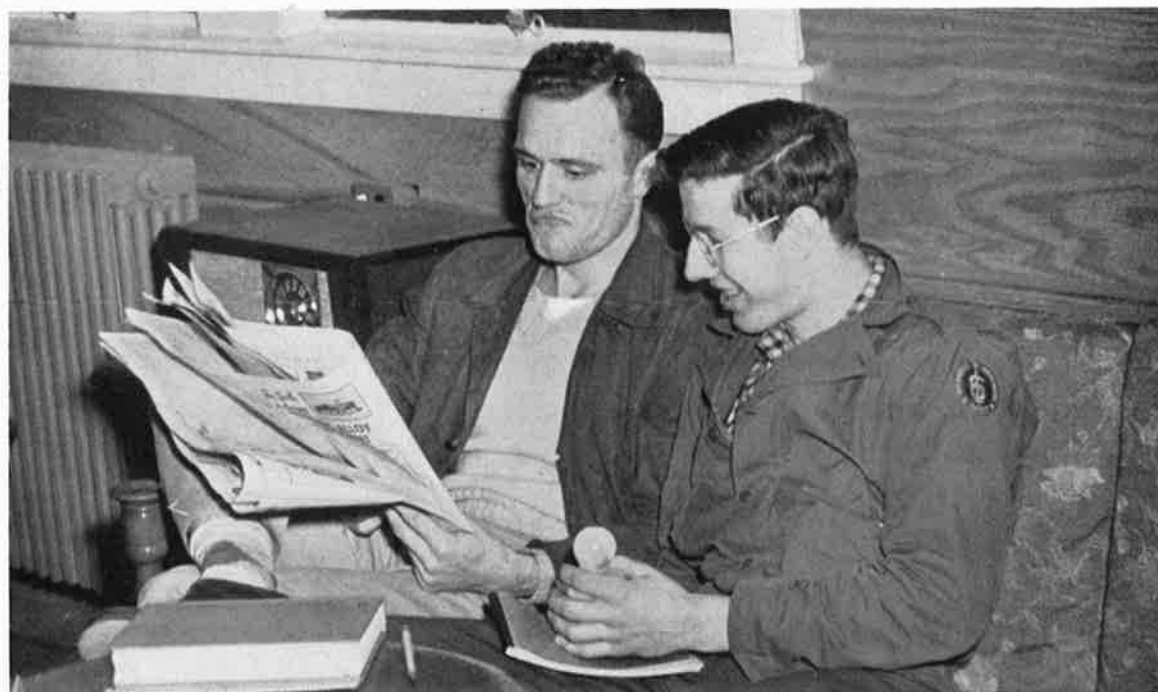
